At 10:00 a.m. Chairman James E. Douglas, Jr. called the meeting to order. Mr. Douglas expressed regret on being notified of Mr. Roy E. Julie's resignation. He then welcomed Mr. Robert J. Rubelmann as the new Commission from Maryland.

Mr. Douglas asked for action on the record of the last two meetings, recalling that there was not a unorum present at the meeting held September 13, 1974. He said that the record of that meeting and the Minutes of the meeting held June 28, 1974 had been mimeographed and circulated to the Commissioners prior to today.

the following motion was made and seconded:

"That the proceedings of meeting held 9/13/74 be approved as submitted and entered in the record as part of the Minutes of December 6, 1974 meeting." The motion was approved.

The following motion was made and seconded:

"That the Minutes of the meeting held June 28, 1974 be approved." The motion was approved.

Grant

A report on the status of the application(s) for Federal/In-Aid Shellfish Emergency Rehabilitation Program was presented by Mr. Norris. This report xhowed:
1) that the original application for \$381,000 through Virginia Office of Emergency Services was never approved; 2) through the efforts of Mr. Douglas, we have received \$78,000 from PL 88-309-4(b) funds of the National Marine Fisheries Service, with \$11,000 due at a later date; and, 3) a revised Grant-In-Aid application for \$281,000 has been submitted to NMFS. Final decision on this \$281,000 is expected no earlier than March or April 1975.

Mr. Everngam read the Resolutions of Appreciation for former Commissioners J. Clifford Hutt, James L. Sisson, Jr., and Roy E. Julie, Jr.

The following motion was made and seconded:

"That the Resolutions as read be adopted and that the originals be forwarded to the Commissioners and a copy be spread upon the Minutes of this meeting." The motion was approved unanimously.

WHEREAS, Mr. Julie has a keen interest in preserving seafood resources, and as a member of this Commission did manifest a concern that the necessary conservation and maintenance of the tidewater portion of the Potomac River fishery be improved; and

WHEREAS, Mr. Julie has in our jedgment attempted at all times to further the fine purpose expressed by the General Assemblies of Maryland and Virginia in enacting the Potomac River Compact of 1958;

NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED, that the members of the Potomac River Fisheries Commission do hereby express their regard and esteem for his service on the Commission and the fellowship of his company during the years of his membership.

There being no other old business, new business was declared in order.

Disbursements, which had been circulated to the Commissioners in itemized form several days prior to the meeting for the following months, were considered:

June 1974 - \$154,835.50 (\$143,368.24 for shells)

July 1974 - \$102,733.54 (\$94,946.95 for shells)

August 1974 - \$74,911.79 (\$14,816.96 for shells & \$55,000.00

for notes paid)

September 1974 - \$81,596.43 (\$75,000 for notes paid)

October 1974 - \$7,107.83

November 1974 - \$64,875.17 (\$60,000.00 transfer of funds on C/D's)

The following motion was made and seconded:

"That the disbursements and transfers between banks as listed and itemized totaling \$486,060.26 for the months of June, July, August, September, October and November 1974 be approved."

The motion was approved.

A statement of funds as of December 4, 1974 was presented and examined by the Commission. The statement showed \$22,179.05 in checking account in the Bank of Westmoreland, Inc., plus \$60,000 in C/D's equally divided among the Bank of Southern Maryland, Maryland Bank and Trust Company and The Peoples Bank of Montross.

A report by Maryland and Virginia laboratory personnel on Joint Surveys of seed and shell planting areas was given by Mr. Dexter Haven. He said that results of the Cultchless Spat Experiment begun in fall of 1972 in the Morgantown area show a survival rate of about 50%, which is within tolerable limits. He also said these results prove conclusively that hatchery seed planting is quite feasible in the Potomac and the larger the seed, the greater is the percentage of survival. The highest mortality occured in spat which were 1/2" or less when planted, and that some of this mortality is due to fresh water from Tropical Storm, AGNES, He then referred to 11/8/74 and 11/27/74 survey reports (copies of which are on file), which show spat counts per bushel on shell cultch planted in May and June 1974 as follows:

Thicket Point 46
Great Neck 314 to 610
Jones Shore 1,096 to 1,485
Jones Shore (natural cultch) 300
Cornfield (on oysters) 84

Middle and upper river bars received no set

There was a lengthy discussion on the heavy late set (fish scale size spat) on large oysters on Jones Shore. As a result, the cull policy on Jones Shore was revised to read: "on Jones Shore the exceedingly small late (1974) spat would be allowed to pass the cull board; however, spat larger than this year's but less than 3" must be returned, together with the larger oyster if attached so as to render removal impossible without destroying the smaller oyster, except that one (1) small oyster per large oyster would be allowed." This policy was adopted on a temporary basis. Mr. Dunnington and Mr. Haven were requested to keep a close watch on the area to determine the effect of this new policy.

 $\,$  Mr. Norris presented a comparative report on oyster production for fall of 1973 and 1974 as follows:

He said that it is possible that the increase is due to increased harvest effort and better reporting caused by several factors, one of which is more intensive checking on catches and sales by PRFC administration and marine police. Mr. Dunnington cautioned that, even with the apparent increase in harvest, the tongers are still working on a smaller number of oysters than they were last year — we have had no set in the river over the past few years.

Mr. Douglas named Mr. Lankford and Mr. Hunt as a Nominating Committee and asked them to report a slate of officers for 1975 at the next meeting.

Mr. Douglas named Mr. Everngam, Mr. Norris, Supervisor Dameron and Capt. Cook to the Legislative Committee. They are to contact interested parties and formulate any possible Regulation changes and report at the next meeting.

In regard to some fishing equipment seized in spring of 1974, the following motion was made and seconded:

"That any property(ies) which had been confiscated and subsequently forfeited by the courts to this Commission for its disposition should be sold at a public auction, and further that the Executive Secretary and Legal Officer be hereby authorized to arrange and conduct an auction of this equipment as soon as possible." The motion was approved.

A "progress report" on Development of a Long Range Plan for Management of the Oyster Fishery in the Potomac River, by Dr. Jackson Davis and Mr. Dexter Haven (VIMS) and Mesrs. K. Drobeck and E. Dunnington (CBL), was presented and briefly explained and discussed. Copies of this report are on file. At the request of the Commission, those presenting the "progress report" said that they would continue working and present the final report as soon as it is completed.

Mr. Robert J. Rubelmann reported that he had attended a meeting in Newport News regarding Maryland General Assembly's House Joint Resolution #61 (1974 session), which requested the Maryland Governor to ask the Virginia Governor to appoint an interstate committee to study fisheries laws and practices. It was concluded at that meeting that the Potomac River Fisheries Commission was most important and involved because of present or exicting interaction between the two states. He said that the Potomac River is an important focal point between Maryland and Virginia in regard to any new interstate management.

Mr. Norris presented the revised fish and oyster license applications, explaining that the major differences between this form and the old form was that the new application did not require a Notary's signature and had been shortened in size but not in content. The forms were examined and the following motion was made and seconded:

"That the fish and oyster license applications bearing a revision date of August 1974 be approved for use." The motion was approved.

The Salary Study Committee reported its findings on salary ranges for comparable positions in Maryland, Virginia and PRFC. After the Committee's recommendations were heard, the following motion was made and seconded:

"That the annual salary for the position of Bookkeeper will be \$6,240.00; of Office Manager \$9,000.00; of Assistant Executive Secretary \$11,000.00; of Executive Secretary \$17,000.00; and of Legal Officer \$7,500.00, and that these salaries will be effective January 1, 1975." The motion was unanimously approved.

Mr. John T. Parran, Jr. said that he had received a request from some St. Mary's County residents to open the river for clamming. Mr. Elgin Dunnington reported that he, Dexter Haven, Robert Norris, Ralph Dameron and A. C. Carpenter had recently conducted a survey at the request of the same people. A local clam boat was used to determine if harvestable quantities of clams existed in the Potomac. The areas checked were selected by the clam boat operator. The results indicated only one small area at Blakiston Island with adult clams but not in harvestable quantities. No clams were found elsewhere. The Commission then decided that no action would be taken on this matter at this time.

Mr. James W. Dutton requested that the Commission issue a statement listing the type, or types, of lighting devices that would satisfy the Regulations. He then objected to the Legislative Committee having no watermen representation. The Chairman informed him that the watermen would have ample time to express their views at the public hearing held on any proposed Regulation changes. Mr. Dutton presented the Commission with a copy of proposedchanges he felt were needed. These were turned over to the Legislative Committee for study. Mr. Dutton pointed out that Maryland has recently repealed and re-enacted all fisheries laws and that the Compact calks for enforcement of Maryland laws prior to 1958, which have not been changed or modified by this Commission. Therefore, he questioned what effect the Maryland action has had on any Maryland law ehich might apply on the Potomac River. Mr. Douglas said he did not think there would be any effect; he then asked Mr. Everngam to study this and give a written reply.

After a discussion of the possibility of excessive use of chlorine in light of recent discoveries by Marine Biologists that even very small amounts can be harmful to marine life, specifically oyster larvae, the following motion was made and seconded:

"As the Potomac River Fisheries Commission is vitally interested in maintaining and improving the seafood resources of the Potomac River, it hereby requests that the Chesapeake Biological Laboratory and the Virginia Institute of Marine Science, and/or any other public agency from either state that may be involved with water quality, establish a research program to determine the amounts andidentify the sources of chemicals introduced into the river which would in any manner pollute, damage or adversely affect the river waters, the oysters, crabs, clams, fish and other seafood, or their spawning and growing areas and the natural rocks and habitats in which they exist."

The motion was approved.

Mr. Norris reported that Mr. Herbert Wilkerson has offered to sell cultchless spat to this Commission. The spat were offered for .005¢ for 1/2" spat and .0075¢ for 3/4" spat. After a short discussion, it was decided that although we are interested in the cultchless spat, our present financial status would not allow any commitment at this time.

The following motion was made and seconded:

"That the Legal Officer be authorized to proceed with whatever action was proper and necessary to arrive at a final settlement with the building contractor concerning some corrections that have been necessary to the building and its components."

The motion was approved.

Mr. W. E. Ashburn, whose 1975 gill net license renewals had been delayed by the Executive Secretary due to a number of complaints about his gill net operation last spring, was informed that he would be allowed to renew his licenses but was told that the Legislative Committee would be studying possible changes in fishing laws due to said complaints.

The next Commission meeting was set for 10:00 a.m., February 7, 1975 at Colonial Beach, Virginia.

A motion to adjourn was made, seconded and approved at 11:50 a.m.
